Grants given in 2017



The American GI Forum received \$600 to purchase a series of workbooks for the participants' use in the English for Spanish Speakers Education classes for adults that is provided by the American GI Forum.

The Ulysses Lions Club applied for and received \$3,000 to purchase a new SPOT Pedia-Vision Screener for the Kansas Kid-Sight Program. Their goal is to screen the vision of each child in Grant County before they go to kindergarten.



The Bob Wilson Memorial Grant County Hospital Auxiliary received \$6,474.39 to further their programs that benefit the patients in the hospital and provide scholarships for people entering the medical field.



Kepley Middle School received \$160 to purchase the Dave Ramsay Smart Money Smart Kids Foundations in Personal Finance curriculum for the middle school.

UHS received a grant of \$4,500 to purchase equipment to enhance the Skreened and U-Print student ran product design courses with a Vinyl Printer/Cutter machine and a set of CMYK ink color pouches.

The Dexter D. Harbour Post #79 and the Ulysses Boy Scouts received \$1,050 to purchase 15 bronze emblems Veteran for the Crosses at the Ulysses Cemetery. This is an Eagle Scout Service Project for Levi Giesaking who did the



work to replace, reposition and repaint the Veteran Crosses.

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Grant County Gives

Each year the Grant County Community Foundation discusses whether to sponsor Grant County Gives for another year. We understand there can be a certain amount of "event Fatigue" for annual projects and events. We will be having that conversation very soon to consider Grant County Gives for 2018.

We are asking for feedback about the effectiveness of the program and how it benefits the community. We asked the organizations to share how they use the money they receive from Grant County Gives. A few of the responses are:

"We use our GCG money to support our children's programming," said Melissa Martinez of Compass Behavioral Health. "We plan to purchase a picnic table and glider for our side yard, so that we can create a comfortable outdoor space for our child clients."

"GCG money goes towards the Helping Hands Fund for Ulysses. We use this money to assist families in need by providing food, emergency utility assistance, fuel for traveling to appointments and many other crises essentials," said Andrea Gallegos, Genesis Family Health.

Free Cancer Screening





Women of Purpose sponsored a Free Cancer Screening at the Bob Wilson Memorial Grant County Hospital Clinic. The Free Cancer Screening was provided by Leave a Legacy who received the grant for the screening. There were 67 people who were screened at the clinic with an estimated 4 screenings per person—268 screenings provided in 2 hours. Everyone received the screenings they wanted. The screenings provided were:

- ♦ Skin Cancer Screening
- Breast Cancer Screening
- Prostate Screening
- PAP Testing
- PPSA Lab Testing

- Bone Density Screening
- ♦ Blood Pressure Checks
- Oral Cancer Screening
- Pre-Diabetes Screening

Of the screenings provided:

- \Rightarrow 20 women receiving breast exams were referred for mammograms
- ⇒ 5 abnormal skin screenings with 2 suspected melanomas.
- ⇒ All were referred for further treatment

All of the mammograms were provided by Women of Purpose or Early Detection Works.

All of the mammograms and the 5 abnormal skin screenings were early detection for possible cancer. This is pretty sobering to have 38% of the 67 participants identified for possible cancers and referred on for further testing and/or treatment.

Beat Cancer with prevention and early detection.
