For 2 Grant County Agencies, what started as a dream in 2012 turned into a "dream come true" one exciting day in 2013.

In the spring of 2012, Kristy Frazee. Administrator of the Grant Co. Health Department & Jerry Jo Director Deckert. of the Grant Co. Ambulance Service were focused on the future funding for their depart-With the ments. support of Grant the County Commissioners, they took these actions:

Estate Gifts leave a lasting Legacy

- Established Agency Funds with GCCF to handle donations.
- Participated in Grant County Gives, receiving donations and m a t c h i n g funds.

In 2013, both of these county departments received sizeable gifts from the estate of Floadene Hertel that were added to their Agency Funds in GCCF.

- Over \$83,000 for the Grant County Health Dept.
- Nearly \$49,000 for the Ambulance Service.



Congratulations to all of these forward thinking people, the department heads and the commissioners for their vision and preparation. Now, Floadene's gift will give back to these agencies forever!

Using historical yields as a basis, in 16 years, the Grant County Health Department and the Ambulance Service will receive grants totaling the entire amount of the legacy gift. And the funds will both increase by 32%.

Projections for 50 years reveal that given historical yields, the gifts will produce grants for these 2 organizations equaling 4 times the original gift and the fund will more than double its beginning balance!

Thanks to many generous donors, a total of \$108,444.40 was received for the participating organizations during the 2013 Grant County Gives campaign. Checks totaling 108,444.40

were distributed to the 20 organizations, with each one receiving the donations designated for it plus 69.7% from the matching funds pool.

The matching fund donors

are a key part of the success of the program. A total of \$32,250 was donated by 17 businesses and individuals providing an additional 69.7% to donations made during Grant County Gives.



2013 was a phenomenal year of growth for GCCF with an increase of \$296,129. Of that amount. \$60,000 was from the Kansas Health Foundation as a partial paythe \$300,000 ment on GROW II grant approved for the Grant County Community Foundation. The rest came from the people of Grant County.

At year-end, GCCF had asset totals of \$754,357!
